BARROW AREA PLANNING REPORT

1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 This report brings together information from across the Community teams including Community Development, Archives and Libraries, and provides an update on work and agreed activity since the last meeting of the Committee.

2.0 STRATEGIC PLANNING AND EQUALITY IMPLICATIONS

2.1 The County Council's vision set out in the Council Plan 2018-2022 is to be "a Council that works with residents, businesses, communities and other organisations to deliver the best services possible within the available resources." The approach and work of the Local Committee directly contributes to this, and area based working, and shaping services locally is one of the key ways of delivering this vision.

2.2 The work of Barrow Local Committee, through its Area Plan and projects helps to achieve the Council Plan 2018-2022 outcomes, which are:

- People in Cumbria are healthy and safe**
- People in Cumbria are well connected and thriving**
- The economy in Cumbria is thriving and benefits everyone**

2.3 The development, operation and monitoring of the Council Plan requires a focus on the Council's performance against the identified outcomes, increasingly understood through localities. Barrow Area Plan sets out three targeted priorities for the area, which are:

- Improving health and well-being and tackling poverty**
- To support Cumbria's Early Help strategy which enables support for children, families and young people**
- Promoting sustainable economic growth and creating jobs.**

2.4 *The locally devolved funding is available for Local Committees to allocate within the area to support positive outcomes, targeted and mainstream, designed to improve outcomes for the communities of Barrow. This funding can be targeted to initiate new activity or to enhance/complement existing provision according to locally determined need.*

2.5 *Local Committee is mindful of equality issues and duly considers that its actions and decisions do not result in inequality of service provision or exclusion from participation. The work of Local Committee directly supports the Council's wider equalities agenda.*

3.0 RECOMMENDATION

3.1 *That Members note the updates in this report.*

4.0 BACKGROUND

4.1 This report provides Members with an update of the work of Barrow Local Committee and the Community Services Teams since its meeting of 18 November 2020 and outlines provisional and actual expenditure against Local Committee's budget as of 30 November 2020

4.2 Members continue to meet informally through virtual informal meetings to share information, discuss issues and recommend courses of action. Since the last meeting of Local Committee a number of specific meetings have been held and are outlined below. In addition, a number of partnership meetings and outside bodies which some members of Local Committee attend, have been held, and are also highlighted for information:

4.3 In addition to these specific meetings, Members continue to meet three weekly at Informal Local Committee sessions. Topics which have been discussed at these include:

- The Child Centred Policing Team
- Cumbria Coastal Strategy
- Covid response and recovery work
- Highways issues

4.4 Members also continue to be kept informed through regular communications from the Area Manager and Community Development Team.

Covid response

4.5 The Barrow Resilience Group continues to meet fortnightly and is chaired by the Area Manager, with Councillors Hamilton, McEwan and Burns representing the Local Committee on this body. The Group has continued to review the situation as it changes and helps to co-ordinate work and resources as needed. The Meeting in December focussed largely on financial wellbeing and in particular fuel poverty, and the challenge of ensuring that people are able to access the right support.

4.6 As Members are aware the 0800 helpline continues to operate and support anyone in need. In addition, a leaflet containing key contact details for various organisations who can provide support, from food to health and wellbeing has now been delivered to every household in Cumbria. Following feedback from the Resilience Group however additional leaflets were requested to enable schools and other partners to have spare copies to help them advise and guide people as appropriate. 3,000 additional leaflets were therefore circulated locally.

4.7 **Collaborative Bid** - Following discussions at the Resilience Group it was agreed to submit a further collaborative bid to the Cumbria Community Foundation. In December we were made aware that that the bid was successful with just over £83,000 being awarded. The projects this grant will support have been identified by organisations working closely with residents and communities. The work that will benefit from the funding is outlined below:

- Age UK loaning tablets to socially isolated individuals supported with a staff member to help them use the tablet to virtually connect with family/friends.
- SAFA telephone helpline for an additional counsellor to support residents that are struggling with mental health issues, COVID fears, anxiety etc.
- The Well's Wellfed Club - to set up 2 Wellfed Clubs in Greengate Children's Centre and Bram Longstaffe to support vulnerable families.
- Women's Community Matters to support the most vulnerable families with family cooked meals.
- Co-ordinated arts projects through 5 arts organisations to deliver on-line and where possible activities to socially isolated families.
- Community Resource Distribution Points for providing food and essential supplies at pinch points such as the end of furlough, Christmas holidays etc.

Financial Wellbeing Summit

4.8 At one of the Informal Local Committee meetings Members also discussed financial wellbeing and proposed that a financial wellbeing summit which brought together key partners and organisations would be really beneficial to start to really explore the issues associated with this and what could be done to help improve and develop wider support going forward. This was also discussed at the Barrow Resilience Group as this is a key priority for that

body. As such a summit was arranged for Wednesday 16th December. This was well attended with over 40 individuals and organisations joining the session. The group broke into 3 workshops focussing on

- Food
- Finance
- Other (including heating, digital access, clothing, transport, hygiene poverty, etc)

4.9 There were some good discussions on the day and the Community Development Team are at the time of writing in the process of pulling together the notes and actions from this session. This will be reported back to Local Committee and the Local Resilience Group to help identify next steps and actions that need to be taken.

Christmas Support

4.10 At the September Local Committee Meeting, Members agreed to £10,000 funding towards supporting families at Christmas. Support for vulnerable residents has also been a priority focus for the Resilience Group. A Christmas Holiday Task & Finish Partnership was therefore set up and led by the Community Development Officer, and included Barrow Foodbank, Community Resource Distribution Point representative (Spring Mount), Furness Education Consortium, Salvation Army, Age UK, Project John, Family Action, Furness Multicultural Forum and Inspirational House Charity.

4.11 Through their work the partnership secured over £23,000 plus additional support in kind and donations of toys. The offer that was provided was:

- Luxury Christmas Food Hampers supported both vulnerable families and socially isolated vulnerable families with the 'nice to have' items for Christmas being made up by Barrow Foodbank.
- Support for families with vouchers was a partnership between The Salvation Army and The Entertainer Toy Shop where they have a national agreement. The referred families received a voucher from the Salvation Army and then purchased the appropriate toys for their children. A wrapping pack was also provided.
- As toys in the Entertainer Toy Shop were up to 14 years old Dropzone distributed the gift vouchers to the older teenagers.
- Through the Christmas Appeal by Project John and Family Action toys that had been donated locally were gifted to families in addition to the voucher scheme.
- The Christmas Wellbeing Hamper for socially isolated vulnerable adults comprised toiletries, local gifts and a supermarket gift card.

4.12 At the time of writing there have been requests for 258 food hampers, 441 vouchers for children/teenagers, 187 wellbeing hampers and 59 for toys. (NB this doesn't include Barrow Foodbank and Community Resource Distribution Points direct contact with communities).

4.13 These Referrals have come from a range of sources including schools, social workers, health professionals and County Council services.

Barrow Town Deal

- 4.14 As Members are aware Barrow was successful in its Town Deal Bid with £25m being allocated for its projects. One of the projects within this is “Community Wellbeing Hubs and Earnse Bay Outdoor Centre.” In practical terms this is made up of 4 projects that came from Local Committee’s Area planning work:
- Ormsgill Community Centre
 - Barrow Island Hub
 - Town Centre Hub
 - Earnse Bay
- 4.15 Whilst significant work needs to be done to develop a full business case for this scheme to enable the funding to be drawn down, it is expected that all being well this would secure in the region of £4m for these projects, (although much of the funding would be required for the Earnse Bay site).
- 4.16 Community engagement and co-production is key to the success of this, and as such a significant amount of work will be undertaken around this supported by the Community Team. An initial stakeholder meeting was held on 14th December to bring partners up to speed on this work, to which all Local Committee Members were invited. The governance structures around this scheme are currently being developed and further discussions will be held with Members around this early in the New Year.

Borderlands

- 4.17 Members received a presentation from colleagues in Economic Development in late October about the Borderlands Programme and in particular the Place Programme. Members agreed that they wished to set up the Borderlands Dalton Town Team as soon as possible to start to take this work forward. As such an initial meeting of this group was held on 8th December.
- 4.18 Initial membership of this Group is made up of:
- Local Committee Chair and Vice Chair and Divisional Members
 - Borough Council Members and officer
 - Town Council Members and officer
 - Health representative
 - Business representative
 - Community representative
 - Area Manager and Community Development Officer
 - Project Officer
- 4.19 Councillor Hamilton as Chair of Local Committee has agreed to be Chairman of this group.
- 4.20 A crucial element of this work is community engagement, with the community influencing and shaping this work. It was recognised that the main board meetings would not enable this to happen easily and therefore a separate sub group (Dalton Community Partnership) has been established. The community partnership has been set up to help inform the Dalton Borderlands Town Team. The partnership comprises a cross-sector of organisations that represent the Dalton communities of young people, older people, sports, schools, police, fire & rescue and held its first meeting in

December. This is chaired by Mr Barry Doughty who is the group's representative on the Town Team and is supported by the Community Development Officer

- 4.21 The Town team will re-convene in January to look at taking this work further forward with colleagues in Economic Programmes, and the consultants who have been appointed to support this work.

Area Working and Community Services Update

- 4.22 The team locally have also continued to work to support area planning activity and priority areas of work and key areas are highlighted below for Members information.

- 4.23 **Barrow Main Library redevelopment** - The works that were originally scoped for the main library and archive centre have now been completed and the building is looking truly spectacular. The Community Skills and Learning service have also moved into the building and the old museum room has been transformed and will serve as a classroom for learners for part of the time and for events and other activities when not in use in this way. The foyer work is due to take place early in the new year which will complete the project. A more detailed update about the work of the Libraries and Archive Service is outlined below

- 4.24 **Ormsgill Hub** – The building work has now been completed on the community centre. Due to the ongoing covid situation the building will not be able to fully re-open immediately as was originally envisaged, rather it will be a phased opening with children's centre activities and staff beginning in line with Family Action's processes and risk assessments initially. It is then hoped that Community Skills and Learning courses will be able to be delivered from the site in the new year (subject to appropriate risk assessments etc.) and then as the situation develops community and partner activity will begin as permitted. The project group for this Area Planning priority will be reconvened early in the new year to begin to progress this further

- 4.25 **Stronger Together** – The Community Development Officer, working with Uclan and the Furness Multi Cultural Forum successfully applied for approximately £19,000 from the Cumbria Community Foundation to fund the second phase of the Stronger Together project. The principle aim of this project is to work with Furness Multicultural Community Forum to employ a member of staff to support the community to work with partner agencies to co-produce and deliver interventions to help meet the needs of the community of Ormsgill. It also aims to build capacity in the group of dedicated volunteer residents already making a huge contribution to their community.

- 4.26 These aims will be achieved through the following activities:

- i. Capacity Building of Local Volunteers: One local resident will be supported by the project lead to be awarded a bursary and to complete a youth work qualification.

- ii. Co-produce community led community wellbeing programmes: This will include a peer mentorship programme, an intergenerational connectivity project, the development of a youth committee and a connecting mum's group. It also includes a dedicated approach to working with BAME community members, to help develop volunteering opportunities to build capacity and community cohesion.
- 4.27 **Centenary House Community Asset Transfer** - The Community Asset Transfer has now been approved by Cabinet. The Community Team continue to work with Barrow Domestic Appliances who are planning to expand their current offer, which includes offering more volunteering, apprenticeships, work experience, and employment opportunities. They provide work experience, volunteering and training opportunities for people who have been in long term unemployment or with disabilities, and will increase the number of opportunities available for people due to the size of the building and increase in work required. They also hope to be able to employ someone to deal with low cost repairs more quickly and in greater volume.
- 4.28 **Dalton Children's Centre** - Work looking at the children's centre in Dalton is progressing well with a project group in place and meeting regularly. A further update will be provided to members early in the new year.
- 4.29 **Barrow Island Hub** - As has previously been reported to Members, Friends of Bram have been given an initial twelve month license to operate the Bram Longsaffe building to enable them to begin to develop their offer and the Hub. Due to Covid some of the original plans for organisations to work from the site have been paused but will be picked up as soon as is possible. As one of the Resource Distribution Points, Bram has been crucial in supporting vulnerable residents over the past months with food parcels and other essential support. This has continued to show how integral the hub is to the community. As with Ormsgill the project group is being re-convened early in the new year.
- 4.30 **Egerton Court Partnership Project** – As Members are aware, the Egerton Court Wellbeing Hub had to close at the end of March due to COVID-19 when the country went into lockdown, and has been unable to open since in a COVID safe and secure way that protects both partners and tenants. The two-year lease on the Wellbeing Hub came to an end in October and a decision was taken based on current circumstances not to renew the lease. However, the project will continue as there has been great partnership work undertaken on Egerton Court over the years and the relationships and trust built with the tenants in helping them manage their lives and situations better.
- 4.31 Therefore, it is being proposed that The Well will take the lead on the project (subject to funding) in an outreach capacity in partnership with CCC Health & Wellbeing Coaches, linking to the Bram Longstaffe Hub, so helping to integrate Egerton Court into the wider Barrow Island community.
- 4.32 When it is safe to do so with Covid regulations, the Egerton Court Tenants Association, which was set up prior to lockdown will be re-formed to develop the gardening ideas on Egerton Court and any other initiatives they may have to support their community.

Sport and Physical Activity.

- 4.33 **Hindpool Tigers** – The Community Development Officer has linked the rugby club up with ‘Volunteer It Yourself (VIY)’ which is a national organisation, where participants aged 14 upwards work with a grassroots club to improve club facilities and also learn new skills for employability. A representative from VIY is coming to Barrow in the New Year to meet Emma and the Tigers to take things forward. This will be the first time VIY have worked in Cumbria. <https://volunteerityyourself.org/>
- 4.34 **Age UK Barrow & District** - Work has taken place with Age UK Barrow & District to explore opportunities to get older people active while in their own homes. This has resulted in a Yoga and Chair Based exercise project, which have now received £2800 from Sport England Tackling Inequalities Fund. This project will be combined with the CCF funding Age UK have received for iPads with built in sim cards which will be loaned to anybody who does not have IT / Wi-fi at home. Older Adults will receive free weekly activity classes via Zoom, with IT support from Age UK, this will commence in the new year.
- 4.35 **Barrow Island Cav Park – Starting February 2020** – The Community Development Officer has worked with Barrow Integrated Care Community, Barrow Island Sports Trust and local instructors to design and receive £1390 to deliver the programme to local residents;

There are now 11 projects created in Barrow since the Summer, resulting in £31701.15 of funding from the ‘Tackling inequalities’ Sport England Fund

SOCIAL DISTANCING

- 4.36 **Crowd Funding & Sport England** - Hawcoat Park Sports & Social Club recently ran a Crowd Funding initiative and have raised over £32,000, they will now also receive £10k from Sport England. <https://www.crowdfunder.co.uk/hawcoat-park-sports-club>
- 4.37 **FREE Life Leisure Memberships for Care Leavers & Vulnerable Families** - Life Leisure have been successful in receiving funding for memberships for both care leavers and vulnerable families. Emma has worked with colleagues in Childrens Services and the leisure centre and there is now a referral system in place so memberships gets to those families and individuals as quickly as possible.

4.38 **NEW Dodgeball Club for Dropzone & Furness Carers** - Work is taking place with both organisations and Dodgeball UK to create a fun weekly club for the youngsters.


4.39 **Wheels 4 All Barrow Club** Funding applications are currently being drawn up to start the weekly inclusive cycling club in Barrow Park next Spring. Wheels 4 all, the cycling charity will be the applicant, they will run the club for several month, with Leonard Cheshire supporting.

Barrow Libraries and Archives

4.40 When the second lockdown was announced we opened Roose library offering our Select and Collect service from there as well as being open for essential PC use. This was a bookable feature, allowing the customers 45 minutes of PC usage to pay bills, apply for jobs etc. Walney was also being used as a base for the Home delivery service (although this has moved back to recommence from Barrow Library from the week beginning 7th December).

4.41 After the second lockdown ended Barrow library was re-opened Monday to Friday for browsing/loaning purposes. PC access and select and collect has also been moved back there as well as the Home delivery service.

4.42 With the exception of the foyer, all the major building works have finished now and the boat, teenage area, and glass pod have all been installed. The team have worked extremely hard to get the library back to normal, including deep cleaning, stocktaking, and moving areas around in the library and getting the children's area ready. The library is looking excellent after the works and the pictures below show some of the changes.



4.43 The service was aiming to extend the opening hours over December and to re-open Askam, Dalton and Walney to the public during this time as well. However following the announcement of the new national lockdown at the beginning of January, in line with government guidance, our libraries are currently closed for browsing and general library use. Barrow Library, Roose Library, or Walney Library will be available for some of our key services which include: [Select & Collect](#) and limited access to PCs which all require booking in advance as well as home delivery and [online services](#).

4.44 **Tablets** - During lockdown, the Librarian acquired 10 tablets, through the Good things foundation. They were brand new, with pre-paid SIM cards on and free to anybody in the community who didn't have access to the internet

and were in the vulnerable category. This were a huge success and were delivered to 6 of our regular customers as well as 4 to ladies who attend Womens Community Matters. The team preloaded them with Cumbria County Council apps, such as Borrow box and Press Reader, as well as Skype. They were then delivered with handy guides on how to access all the apps and how to download others. The customers were also given the libraries number in case they needed additional support. All of the customers have found these devices extremely helpful during lockdown, as it has given them access to the outside world, books and entertainment.

- 4.45 **Virtual Art Gallery** - During lockdown, the team thought of a good way to showcase some of the archives material we have, by creating a virtual art gallery. This was published on Facebook, and got good responses, leading to plans to replicate this approach across the county.
- 4.46 **Virtual Tour of Barrow Library Building** - In addition to the stocktake and revival projects the team are planning to start work on a virtual tour of Barrow Library, similar to the virtual art gallery format. They intend to take pictures of each room of the new library and have information boxes next to each feature, so that people can click on them and learn more. The plan is to post this on Facebook afterwards, in the hope that non-members might see the post and see all the great things at the library, and be encouraged to come in, check it out, and sign up. Its may also help people with anxiety and similar conditions to be able to check out the layout of the library, from the comfort of their own home before coming along.
- 4.47 During lockdown the team used social media to communicate with and inspire our borrowers. They celebrated national campaigns across our social media platforms. Including **Black History Month** where we shared articles, book reviews and recommendations and spotlights on great authors such as Angie Thomas and Malory Blackman. They promoted and participated in **Bookstart week** with daily inspiration, story times and craft ideas and also celebrated **Elmer Day** in a similar way.
- 4.48 **World Book Night** – The team worked with Woman’s Community Matters for this and shared a copy of Things a Bright Girl Can Do with the young women who attend the pause for thought project. They also gifted books to mothers in our half term packs.
- 4.49 For **Cumbria Children’s Book Week** the service highlighted the vital role of reading for young people and families. Reading is so important to us all and especially to the health and wellbeing of young people. In these strange times books are a vehicle to travel wherever your imagination can take you. They encouraged families to keep an eye out of Facebook thought out the festival as we shared inspirational resources to help children find their next great adventure. They shared resources form agency’s such as Booktrust and The Reading Agency to offer high quality resources such as the Reading Agency’s collection of books to help children stay safe, calm, connected and hopeful during the COVID-19 crisis.
- 4.50 **Summer Reading Challenge** - The service also rose to the challenge of delivering **The Summer Reading Challenge** digitally this year. they offered a weekly story time session every Tuesday afternoon, and in collaboration with colleagues throughout Cumbria we had themed weeks with author talks, crafts, books reviews and inspiration to find your next read.

- 4.51 For Christmas they have spotlighted a different children's author each week in December and were delighted to be able to gift books to the Foodbank, Woman's Community Matter and The Christmas Appeal.
- 4.52 **Barrow Archives** - Barrow Archive Centre will reopen on Wednesday 16th December, opening Wednesday to Friday between 9.30am and 1pm. Researchers will need to book and if possible, send a list of the items they would like to see. The team will then get items out prior to their arrival but will also get items out on request. All documents will be quarantined for three days after use.
- 4.53 Following the refurbishment, the Local Studies Library is now separate from the Archive Centre meaning that this valuable resource will be open when the library is open. The newspapers microfilms and Church registers of baptism, marriage and burial will be available as well as local history books and census indexes.
- 4.54 Due to Covid restrictions Archive staff cannot visit schools or give talks in person to societies at the moment, however the Archivist has delivered a session with year 4 of St Pius School on the Furness Railway and the growth of Barrow online and will be running a session for West Lakes U3A on Wednesday 9 December on Art in the Archives.
- 4.55 Work has also continued to edit catalogue collections so that the details are correct on our online catalogue, and the team have continued to answer enquiries.
- 4.56 The Service took part in History Day 2020, the theme being New Worlds. The Archivist asked 5 local historians to record a short piece on one aspect of the history of Barrow, a new town (she did the 6th). These then had images added and she created short videos. These were posted on Facebook and are available on the new Cumbria Libraries and Archives YouTube channel. Along with these she created videos about four new local books. These are also available on the YouTube channel.

Children's Trust Board - Barrow Children & Families Partnership

- 4.57 The Partnership met in November and an update was provided following organisations having been asked to complete the honeycomb model in advance. This identified areas such as what is working well/strengths, what are you worried/concerned about? What will success look like? How do we get there?
- 4.58 A presentation and case study were also provided, and partners were asked to contribute to a discussion about how things could be done differently in Barrow so that children in Barrow could be happy, healthy and succeed.
- 4.59 The discussion also flagged the importance of making sure that the Partnership and the Resilience Group feed into each other to ensure that they are fully joined up.
- 4.60 An update was also provided on the Furness Youth Work Partnership which has recently come together and developed its terms of reference. This is looking at bringing partners and advisers on board in January 2021 and wanted to ensure that it was fully linked into the Children and Families Partnership.

Local Committee Budget

- 4.61 Members have continued to monitor and review their budgets in line with the significantly changed situation, including the recently established Local Committee COVID 19 Response Fund and the additional Coronavirus (COVID-19): Local authority Emergency Assistance Grant for Food and Essential Supplies. A further allocation from the Covid Winter Grant has been allocated to each of the six district areas. This funding is the “Vulnerable Adults Allocation” and for the Barrow area equates to just over £26,000. A meeting has been scheduled for early January to discuss this with Members.
- 4.62 The discretionary budget delegated to Local Committee is detailed in Appendix 1, providing the latest financial position including the committee expenditure and the remaining unallocated resources up to 30 November 2020.

5.0 OPTIONS

- 5.1 This report is for noting

6.0 RESOURCE AND VALUE FOR MONEY IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 There are no direct resource implications arising from recommendation 3.1 to note the updates in this report.
- 6.2 The latest financial position for the revenue budget devolved to Local Committee for items other than Highways is as set out in Appendix 1 (Paragraphs 4.62 and 4.63). Local Committee may allocate the discretionary element of the revenue budget during the course of the financial year to meet its priorities and objectives, subject to corporate policy and service standards.

8.0 CONCLUSION
